Meeting the need for wider PIR delivery - PIR upskilling for adult IRs

Several of you have told us you'd be interested in learning some PIR skills and we are very keen to pursue ways to to offer some paediatric interventions to more children who need it most. There are many ways we can do this. Together with the RCR, we will be bringing out a national PIR policy review this autumn, which should help us to lobby NHSE and other organisations for better resources and recognition. We are also working closely with the NHSE trauma leads and paediatric surgical operational delivery networks to ensure PIR is a key part of their agendas and standards of care. To deliver on this, we need some willing IRs. This may mean a local adult IR who is simply in touch with regional PIRs and knows where to direct onward referrals. But it may also mean one or two adult IRs in tertiary centres who have chosen to upskill in a couple of PIR areas so that they can handle some basic cases when push comes to shove. We recognise that there are many among you who would like to have a basic grounding in PIR so that when that 7yo trauma case comes in or a child needs an imageguided biopsy, you have the confidence and the skills to step up, as well as the support of your Trust. We are working on a course that could do just this. This month we will be sending out a survey through the BSIR, asking for your feedback on this idea. Please take time to complete it, so that we make sure we design something useful and practical, that can help us to change the PIR landscape in the UK together.



More PIR posts announced

Health Education England approved a new Interventional Radiology training post at Birmingham Children's Hospital. This is only the second national PIR training post in the UK. The post will provide comprehensive training in paediatric IR. In addition, the post will give trainees adult IR experience and on-call at the University Hospitals Coventry & Warwickshire.

Leeds Children's Hospital currently have two paediatric IRs and perform some 1000

procedures annually. We are excited to announce the approval of a new post which will support both the paediatric interventional and diagnostic service. The post is likely to be advertised towards the end of the year.

First paediatric IR cryoablation registry goes live: ICECAP



We have been working hard on developing the ICECAP (Infant and Child European Cryoablation) Registry and the end is in sight. We have done a round of testing and are aiming to go-live in September. We hope to capture all paediatric cryoablation procedures from across Europe. The data set required to be entered is small so, if you are doing any paediatric cryoablation, please consider contributing to the registry.
